It will give you an idea of the different ways in which the children work together and the partnership that we seek to create with you.



Our Curriculum

The curriculum is a structured play based curriculum.

It follows the DfES Curriculum Guidance for the Foundation Stage as it states in the document:

"The Foundation Stage is about developing key learning skills such as listening, speaking, concentration, persistence and learning to work together and cooperate with other children. It is also about developing early communication, literacy and numeracy skills that will prepare children for key stage one of the National Curriculum."

(Qualification and Curriculum Authority, 2000)

Hall Times

Each week the children visit the hall for a range of noisier activities and activities that require a bigger space.

These include:

- Circle games and parachute work
- Singing with the school's pianist
- Small apparatus work
- 🔷 Team games
- Using musical instruments
- Large PE apparatus
- Drama and dance

By the end of the week the children have encountered a whole range of experiences, some new, some familiar favourites, all of which help to prepare them for transferring to Key Stage One.

Book Times

Stories and books are a key feature of life in the Foundation Stage. A lot of our themes are based around the books that we read.

Throughout the week, your children will experience a range of different book activities

- They will look at books with their friends and bring a book home to share with you
- They will share non-fiction books as part of our topic work
- They will share books in small groups called 'guided reading', where all the children share and discuss the same book.
- They will read books on their own or in a relaxed way with another adult
- They will be rewarded for the times they read at home by achieving reading stars which are calculated from their reading diaries.

The children will need a Holly book bag (available from the office for a small charge). It needs to come to school with your child every day. Our provision is therefore based on:

- Play
- 🔷 Talk
- Building confidence
- Active learning
- Independent enquiry
- Co-operation
- Exploration and investigation
- Social relationships
- Involving adults to support and challenge learning



Our Principles

Our basic principles are

that we should:

- Help children to make an effective transition from home to school
- Provide a secure, broad, balanced and relevant curriculum
- Enable children to learn and develop the skills, attitudes and understanding that prepare them for Year One and beyond
- Ensure that all children make good progress in line with their developing abilities and achieve high standards

that parents will:

- Feel welcome and involved
- Understand the Foundation Stage and the principles behind it
- Support their children in all areas of learning
- Contribute to the group whenever they can

At other times during the day, the children will take part in teacher led activities. This is a time when a particular skill can be taught or assessed.

Sometimes the children may be playing a game to find out how to order numbers or to find out about rhyming words. They may also learn how to organise themselves for painting and other activities so that when they are working independently they will have the confidence to choose and use the activity to their



Team Times

At the start of each day, the children sit together in their teams for registration. The children then have a team time in which they work in small groups with a member of the Foundation staff.

There are three team times during each morning and afternoon session. Team time gives children the opportunity to develop their confidence to speak to a smaller number of people as well as receive attention that is more individual.

Team times may have a set focus, for example introducing a new activity or sharing news, other times children may review or share results of what they have been doing during independent activities.

that children will:

- Feel happy and secure
- Be interested in what they are doing
- Be engaged in practical activity, enquiry and purposeful play
- Consolidate their learning through practice, talk and reflection



A week in Foundation

We aim to make every day an interesting one for all our children. During each day, you child will be involved in a range of different learning opportunities. These are explained on the following few pages.

Child-initiated play

Time is set aside each day for your child to take part in activities which they choose for themselves. This enables them to become independent people who can make decisions, select equipment, ask questions, organise themselves and co-operate with others. In the early stages, children will need support as they make friends and get to know the environment. As they get more confident they are encouraged to choose more carefully and work on more ambitious, longer term ideas. During these times the following activities are available;

- Mathematical activities
- Writing and drawing
- Construction
- Sand and/or water
- Modelling
- Painting
- Imaginative play
- Sharing books
